SENATE RESOLUTION NO.60

Senators Moss, Brinks, Chang, Cherry, Hertel, McMorrow, Polehanki and Shink offered the following resolution:

- 1 A resolution to recognize June 2023 as Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual,
- 2 Transgender, Queer+ (LGBTQ+) Pride Month.
- 3 Whereas, Pride began in 1970 with the one year anniversary of
- 4 the Stonewall Riots, a multi-day protest that is credited by many
- 5 for starting the modern-day LGBTQ+ movement. In 1969, LGBTQ+
- 6 individuals, led by the efforts of Black and Brown trans women such
- 7 as activists Marsha P. Johnson and Sylvia Rivera, risked their
- 8 lives to protest the over-policing and injustice that threatened
- 9 their existence on a daily basis, and elevated the visibility of
- 10 the movement to a national scale; and
- 11 Whereas, The LGBTQ+ community has persevered through tragedies

and struggles, such as the government's insufficient and delayed 1 response to assisting those with HIV/AIDS and the ongoing effort to 2 protect the rights and ensure the safety of the LGBTO+ community; 3 4 and Whereas, The movement has also celebrated victories of 5 6 recognition, especially the historic Obergefell v. Hodges decision 7 in 2015 which recognized marriage equality nationwide, the Bostock v. Clayton County decision in 2020 that upheld federal employment 8 protections for the LGBTQ+ community, and Rouch World v. Department 9 10 of Civil Rights in 2022 that affirmed LGBTQ+ protections are 11 included in Michigan's Elliott-Larsen Civil Rights Act; and Whereas, After a fifty year legislative effort, the Michigan 12 House and Senate in its 102nd Legislature, at long last, added 13 14 sexual orientation and gender identity or expression as protected 15 classes in the Elliott-Larsen Civil Rights Act, which was signed 16 into law as Public Act 6 of 2023; and Whereas, Still today, LGBTQ+ individuals, especially a 17 18 disproportionate number of trans women of color, continue to be a target of harassment, violence, and discrimination, yet through 19 20 community support and solidarity continue to celebrate love, authentic living, and self-acceptance; and 21 22 Whereas, Michigan stands out in this watershed moment as a 23 state that embraces equality because our communities benefit from 24 diversity and variety in viewpoints, talents, and cultural 25 perspectives of its residents and from preserving the freedom, 26 worth, and dignity of those in the LGBTQ+ community; and 27

Whereas, Michigan should expend all efforts to attract and retain talent and signal to the nation we are welcoming to all those who wish to contribute to the economic vitality of our state;
