SENATE BILL No. 551

November 10, 1987, Introduced by Senators NICHOLS, SCHWARZ, DE GROW, CARL, EHLERS and DILLINGHAM and referred to the Committee on Appropriations.

A bill to amend sections 21 and 35 of Act No. 94 of the Public Acts of 1979, entitled

"The state school aid act of 1979,"

section 21 as amended by Act No. 128 of the Public Acts of 1987 and section 35 as amended by Act No. 276 of the Public Acts of 1982, being sections 388.1621 and 388.1635 of the Michigan Compiled Laws; and to repeal certain parts of the act.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Section 1. Sections 21 and 35 of Act No. 94 of the Public
- 2 Acts of 1979, section 21 as amended by Act No. 128 of the Public
- 3 Acts of 1987 and section 35 as amended by Act No. 276 of the
- 4 Public Acts of 1982, being sections 388.1621 and 388.1635 of the
- 5 Michigan Compiled Laws, are amended to read as follows:
- 6 Sec. 21. (1) Except as otherwise provided in this act, from
- 7 the amount appropriated in section 11, there is allocated to each

- 1 district PURSUANT TO SECTION 11 OF ARTICLE IX OF THE STATE
- 2 CONSTITUTION OF 1963 an amount per membership pupil sufficient to
- 3 guarantee the district for -1987 88 a combined state local yield
- 4 or gross allowance of \$306.00 plus \$75.10 for each mill of oper
- 5 ating tax levied. For purposes of this section, only taxes
- 6 levied for purposes included in the operation cost of the dis-
- 7 trict as prescribed in section 7 shall be considered operating
- 8 tax. The net allocation for each district shall be an amount per
- 9 membership pupil computed by subtracting, from the gross allow
- 10 ance quaranteed the district, the product of the district's state
- 11 equalized valuation behind each membership pupil and the millage
- 12 utilized for computing the gross allowance. 1989-90 AN AMOUNT
- 13 EQUAL TO NOT LESS THAN \$2,956.00 OR 115% OF THE DISTRICT'S
- 14 1988-89 SCHOOL OPERATING EXPENDITURE, WHICHEVER IS LESS.
- 15 An additional \$30.00 per pupil -in gross allowance shall be
- 16 allocated to any district that satisfies the requirements speci-
- 17 fied in -either subdivision SUBDIVISIONS (a) -or AND (b).
- (a) The district requires pupils to have completed as a con-
- 19 dition for graduation -in +988-89 all of the following:
- 20 (i) Three years of English or communication skills.
- 21 (ii) Two years of mathematics.
- 22 (iii) Two years of science.
- 23 (iv) Three years of social science.
- 24 (v) One year of health or physical education, or both.
- 25 (vi) Two years of a foreign language, fine or performing
- 26 arts, vocational education or practical arts, or any combination
- 27 -thereof OF THE SUBJECTS LISTED IN THIS SUBPARAGRAPH.

- (vii) One semester of computer education.
- 2 (b) The district -provides for its pupils in grades 9
- 3 through 12 all of the following: ADMINISTERS A STATE BOARD
- 4 APPROVED EMPLOYABILITY SKILLS TEST.
- 5 (i) Six classes, each consisting of at least 50 minutes of
- 6 classroom instruction or a total of not less than 300 minutes of
- 7 classroom instruction. In either case, at least 30% of the
- 8 pupils in grades 9 through 12 shall be enrolled in the sixth
- 9 period, with the sixth period being a class of an academic nature
- 10 that normally would be credited toward high school graduation.
- 11 This subparagraph does not apply to pupils in grade 9 who do not
- 12 attend classes in the same building as pupils in grades 10
- 13 through 12.
- 14 (ii) Four years of English, with at least 65% of the pupils
- 15 in grades 9 through 12 enrolled in an English course.
- 16 (iii) Three years of mathematics, with at least 45% of the
- 17 pupils in grades 9 through 12 enrolled in a mathematics course.
- 18 (iv) Three years of science, with at least 45% of the pupils
- 19 in grades 9 through 12 enrolled in a science course.
- 20 (v) Three years of social science, with at least 55% of the
- 21 pupils in grades 9 through 12 enrolled in a social science
- 22 course.
- 23 (vi) Two years of a foreign language, vocational education
- 24 or practical arts, or any combination thereof, with at least 25%
- 25 of the pupils in grades 9 through 12 enrolled in a course in 1 of
- 26 these areas.

- 1 (vii) One year of health or physical education, or both,
- 2 with at least 15% of the pupils in grades 9 through 12 enrolled
- 3 in a course in | of these areas.
- 4 (viii) One year of fine or performing arts, with at least
- 5 +0% of the pupils in grades 9 through +2 enrolled in a course in
- 6 tof these areas.
- 7 (ix) One semester of computer education, with at least 5% of
- 8 the pupils in grades 9 through 12 enrolled in the course.
- 9 The department may waive the requirements of subdivision (b)
- 10 for a district with unusual circumstances that is making a good
- 11 faith effort to comply with this subdivision and has a plan in
- 12 place to meet the requirements during the following year.
- In order to be eligible for the additional \$30.00 per pupil
- 14 permitted under this subsection, -unless it has received a waiver
- 15 under subdivision (b), a district shall submit to the department
- 16 not later than October 1, -1987- 1989, a resolution adopted by
- 17 its board indicating that the district complies with all of the
- 18 requirements of either subdivision SUBDIVISIONS (a) or AND
- 19 (b).
- 20 A primary or fourth class school district that sends its
- 21 resident high school pupils to 1 or more districts shall receive
- 22 the additional \$30.00 per pupil permitted under this subsection
- 23 if at least 90% of its resident high school pupils attend schools
- 24 in districts that satisfy the requirements of -either
- 25 subdivision SUBDIVISIONS (a) or AND (b). In this case, the
- 26 primary or fourth class district shall submit to the department

- 1 not later than October 1, -1987 1989, a resolution adopted by
- 2 its board indicating that it complies with this requirement.
- 3 Beginning in 1988 89, a district shall qualify for a high
- 4 school curriculum incentive described in subdivision (b) only if
- 5 the district adopts the graduation requirements described in sub-
- 6 division (a) for pupils graduating in and after the 1991 92
- 7 school year.
- 8 Beginning in 1989 90, a district shall qualify for a high
- 9 school curriculum incentive described in subdivision (b) only if
- 10 the district adopts the graduation requirements described in sub-
- 11 division (a) for pupils graduating in and after the 1991 92
- 12 school year and administers a state board approved employability
- 13 skills test.
- 14 In -1987-88- 1989-90, an additional \$14.00 per pupil in
- 15 gross allowance shall be allocated to any district that satisfies
- 16 the requirements specified in either of the following
- 17 subdivisions:
- (a) The district attains an average class size of not more
- 19 than 25 pupils for grades K, 1, 2, and 3, taken collectively.
- 20 (b) The district reduces its average class size in grades K,
- 21 1, 2, and 3, taken collectively, by at least 10% from the average
- 22 class size in -1984-85- 1987-88.
- For purposes of computing average class size, only the fol-
- 24 lowing staff shall be counted:
- 25 (i) General subject classroom teachers, such as teachers of
- 26 reading, language arts, mathematics, science or social studies,
- 27 and kindergarten teachers.

- (ii) Special subject teachers, such as teachers of art,
 music, or physical education, to the extent that they provide
 instruction to eligible pupils.
- 4 (iii) Special needs teachers, in areas such as compensatory
 5 education, bilingual education, migrant education, or gifted and
 6 talented education, to the extent that they provide instruction
 7 to eligible pupils. The following staff shall not be counted:
- 8 (A) Special education teachers.
- 9 (B) Adult education teachers.
- (C) Professional or nonprofessional support staff.
- 11 (D) Teacher aides, paraprofessionals, or volunteers.
- 12 (E) Administrators or supervisors.
- The department may waive the requirements of subdivision (a) 14 or (b) for a district with unusual circumstances that is making a 15 good faith effort to comply with either of these subdivisions and 16 has a plan in place to meet the requirements for the following 17 year.
- In order to be eligible for the additional \$14.00 per pupil

 19 permitted under this subsection, unless it has received a waiver

 20 for subdivision (a) or (b), a district shall submit to the

 21 department not later than October 1, -1987 1989, a resolution

 22 adopted by its board indicating that the district complies with

 23 the requirements of either subdivision (a) or (b).
- (2) FOR ALLOCATIONS BEGINNING OCTOBER 1, 1990, THE \$2,956.00
 25 PER PUPIL OPERATIONAL EXPENDITURE LIMITATION PROVIDED FOR IN SUB26 SECTION (1) SHALL BE ANNUALLY ADJUSTED BY A PERCENTAGE EQUAL TO
 27 THE PERCENTAGE CHANGE IN THE GROSS NATIONAL PRODUCT IN CONSTANT

- 1 DOLLARS AS DEFINED AND ANNUALLY PUBLISHED BY THE UNITED STATES
- 2 DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE, BUREAU OF ECONOMIC ANALYSIS.
- 3 (3) FROM THE AMOUNT APPROPRIATED IN SECTION 11, THERE IS
- 4 ALLOCATED TO EACH DISTRICT AN AMOUNT PER MEMBERSHIP PUPIL SUFFI-
- 5 CIENT TO GUARANTEE THE DISTRICT FOR 1989-90 A PER PUPIL YIELD FOR
- 6 EACH MILL LOCALLY LEVIED THAT IS EQUAL TO THAT WHICH WOULD BE
- 7 RAISED BY A 1-MILL LEVY IN A DISTRICT AT THE STATE MEDIAN STATE
- 8 EQUALIZED VALUATION PER PUPIL.
- 9 (4) -(2) A district that supported a district library in
- 10 1979-80 and continues to provide support for the district library
- 11 through a millage levied pursuant to Act No. 164 of the Public
- 12 Acts of 1955, as amended, being sections 397.271 to 397.276 of
- 13 the Michigan Compiled Laws, shall be credited, for all computa-
- 14 tions made under this section, with the amount of millage levied
- 15 for library purposes, but not to exceed 0.7 mills, if the dis-
- 16 trict levies not more than 0.7 mills less than its authorized.
- 17 operating millage rate.
- 18 (5) -(3) State -equalization allocations to a district
- 19 UNDER THIS SECTION shall be adjusted by subtracting from the
- 20 allocations money received under chapter 1124, 64 Stat. 1100, 20
- 21 U.S.C. 236 to 244, in the same proportion as the total local rev-
- 22 enues covered under the state equalization program are to total
- 23 local revenues for education in the district, except that not
- 24 more than \$160.00 per pupil shall be subtracted. The proportion
- 25 shall be based on prior year revenue and prior year impact aid.
- 26 A deduction in any year shall not exceed the amount of deductible
- 27 impact aid for which a district is eligible. Any deductions made

- 1 under this act shall be consistent with the requirements of
- 2 section 5 of chapter 1124, 64 Stat. 1100, 20 U.S.C. 240 and its
- 3 regulations.
- 4 (4) If the net allocation computed for a district pursuant
- 5 to subsection (1) is a negative amount, it shall be applied as a
- 6 deduction against any funds otherwise due the district under all
- 7 other sections of this act. However, the deduction made under
- 8 this subsection shall not exceed a percentage of a district's
- 9 total state aid entitlement under all other sections of this act,
- 10 which percentage is determined by dividing the gross allowance
- 11 computed for the district under subsection (1) by the product of
- 12 the district's state equalized valuation behind each membership
- 13 pupil and the millage utilized for computing the gross allowance
- 14 and then subtracting the result from 117%, except that the per-
- 15 centage shall not exceed 60%, and shall be applied after the fol-
- 16 lowing adjustments which shall be based upon per pupil or per
- 17 professional staff member cost in each program:
- 18 (a) The categorical allocations for sections 52 and 61 shall
- 19 be reduced a proportionate amount for nonresident pupils, and the
- 20 categorical allocation for section 97 shall be reduced a propor
- 21 tionate amount for each professional staff member not an employee
- 22 of the district.
- 23 (b) The categorical allocations for section 52 shall be
- 24 increased a proportionate amount for pupils enrolled in a program
- 25 operated by another district or the intermediate district, and
- 26 the categorical allocation for section 97 shall be increased a
- 27 proportionate amount for each professional staff member

- 1 participating in a consortium of districts, or of districts and
- 2 intermediate districts, where the legal fiscal agency is another
- 3 district or intermediate district.
- 4 (5) Funds due under sections 53, 75, 143, 144, and 146 shall
- 5 not be counted for purposes of subsection (4).
- 6 (6) The statewide deductions made under subsection (4) shall
- 7 not exceed \$16,000,000.00 in 1987 88, \$11,000,000.00 in 1988 89,
- 8 and \$6,000,000.00 in 1989 90. Subsections (4), (5), and (6)
- 9 shall not apply after September 30, 1990.
- 10 (6) -(7) A tax levied pursuant to section 1356(4) of the
- 11 school code of 1976, Act No. 451 of the Public Acts of 1976,
- 12 being section 380.1356 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, for the
- 13 retirement of an operating deficit shall be considered levied for
- 14 operating purposes in making computations under this section.
- 15 Sec. 35. (1) The tentative allocations as determined in
- 16 section 34 shall be distributed among districts in decreasing.
- 17 order of concentration of eligible pupils as determined by sec-
- 18 tion 33 until the money appropriated in section 31 is distributed
- 19 if:
- 20 (a) The district has applied for the money on a form pro-
- 21 vided by the department.
- 22 (b) The district has shown evidence of having established
- 23 comparability among schools within the district pursuant to stan-
- 24 dards established by the state board.
- 25 (c) The district is committed to the involvement of parents,
- 26 teachers, and administrators in the planning and continuous

- 1 evaluation of compensatory education programs as conducted under
- 2 this article.
- 3 (d) Each pupil participating in a program funded under this
- 4 article is educationally deprived and was selected from among the
- 5 lowest achievers.
- 6 (e) Each program funded under this article is based on per-
- 7 formance objectives related to educational achievement and is
- 8 evaluated in a manner consistent with those performance
- 9 objectives.
- (f) Each program funded under this article provides supple-
- 11 mentary services designed to meet the unique education needs of
- 12 the children who are participating.
- 13 (g) The district keeps those records and affords access to
- 14 the records as is necessary to verify compliance with the
- 15 requirements of this section.
- 16 (2) A district shall use the state funds for specifically
- 17 identified pupils to supplement, and not supplant, the use of
- 18 federal or local money.
- 19 (3) A participating school building having 50% or more of
- 20 its pupils in grade 4 achieving less than 75% of Michigan educa-
- 21 tion assessment program objectives in reading or math, or both,
- 22 shall be designated a high-need building. The department shall
- 23 determine the achievement gain of the high-need building's pupils
- 24 funded under section 31 as measured by the approved evaluation
- 25 criteria. If the average rate of achievement gain in reading or
- 26 mathematics, or both, for the group is not greater than the
- 27 previous year's compensatory education average rate of

- 1 achievement gain for that building, the district shall request
- 2 consultant service from the department beginning with the
- 3 1979 80 school year and determine whether the building's deliv-
- 4 ery system should be modified. A description of the delivery
- 5 system and rationale for a program under this article for a
- 6 high-need building with pupils funded under section 31, whose
- 7 average rate of achievement gain does not exceed the previous
- 8 year's compensatory education average rate of achievement gain
- 9 for a period of 3 consecutive years after 1976-77, shall be sub-
- 10 mitted by the district to the department for approval.
- 11 (4) The department shall monitor each program funded under
- 12 this article to ensure that the requirements of this section are
- 13 met. A district subjected to a deduction under section 21(4)
- 14 shall not be required to allocate more, to a program funded under
- 15 this article, than an amount per eligible pupil that bears the
- 16 same relation to the amount specified in section 31 as the amount
- 17 actually received by the district under all sections of this act,
- 18 other than sections 53 and 143, bears to the amount that would
- 19 have been due the district under all sections of this act other
- 20 than sections 53 and 143 before the section 21(4) deduction.
- 21 Section 2. Section 25 of Act No. 94 of the Public Acts of
- 22 1979, being section 388.1625 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, is
- 23 repealed.
- 24 Section 3. This amendatory act shall take effect October 1,
- 25 1989.
- 26 Section 4. This amendatory act shall not take effect unless
- 27 Senate Joint Resolution K of the 84th Legislature becomes a part

1 of the state constitution of 1963 as provided in section 1 of
2 article XII of the state constitution of 1963.
