SENATE BILL No. 572

October 30, 1991, Introduced by Senators ARTHURHULTZ, V. SMITH, STABENOW, EHLERS, HOLMES, GEAKE, VAUGHN and O'BRIEN and referred to the Committee on Government Operations.

A bill to create an African American affairs commission and an office of African American affairs; to prescribe the powers and duties of the commission and the office; and to prescribe the powers and duties of certain agencies, departments, and officials.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Sec. 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as the
- 2 "African American affairs commission act".
- Sec. 2. As used in this act:
- (a) "African American" means a person who has origins in any
- 5 of the black racial groups of Africa; is identified by an
- 6 employer in an EEO-1 report as "black"; or is regarded in the
- 7 community as having origins in any of the black racial groups of
- 8 Africa.

- (b) "Commission" means the African American affairs
 commission created in section 3.
- 3 (c) "Department" means the department of civil rights.
- 4 (d) "Director" means the director of the office of African
 5 American affairs.
- 6 (e) "EEO-1 report" means an employer information report
- 7 EEO-1 required to be filed by certain employers pursuant to 29
- 8 C.F.R. 1602.7.
- 9 (f) "Office" means the office of African American affairs
 10 created in section 11.
- 11 Sec. 3. (1) An African American affairs commission is cre-
- 12 ated in the department of civil rights. The commission shall
- 13 exercise its powers and duties independently of the civil rights
- 14 commission except for budget, procurement, and housekeeping
- 15 functions. The commission shall consist of 15 members appointed
- 16 by the governor with the advice and consent of the senate. Five
- 17 appointees shall be appointed from a list of 5 or more nominees
- 18 presented to the governor by the senate majority leader, and 5
- 19 appointees shall be appointed from a list of 5 or more nominees
- 20 presented to the governor by the speaker of the house of
- 21 representatives. The commission annually shall elect a chair-
- 22 person and vice-chairperson, and shall elect other officers from
- 23 its members as it considers advisable.
- 24 (2) Except for initial members, a member of the commission
- 25 shall serve for a term of 3 years or until a successor is
- 26 appointed. Of the members initially appointed, 5 of the members
- 27 shall be appointed for a term of 3 years, 5 of the members shall

- 1 be appointed for a term of 2 years, and 5 of the members shall be
- 2 appointed for a term of 1 year. A vacancy on the commission
- 3 shall be filled by the governor for the balance of the unexpired
- 4 term, not more than 30 days after the vacancy is created, in the
- 5 same manner as the original appointment.
- 6 (3) The commission shall be appointed within 60 days after 7 the effective date of this act.
- 8 Sec. 5. (1) Within 60 days after appointment and confirma-
- 9 tion of all members, the commission shall adopt bylaws for the
- 10 operation of the commission. The bylaws shall include, at a min-
- 11 imum, voting procedures and minimum requirements for attendance
- 12 at meetings.
- 13 (2) The commission shall hold regular quarterly meetings at
- 14 places and on dates fixed by the commission. Special meetings
- 15 may be called by the chairperson or by not less than 8 commission
- 16 members on 3 business days' actual notice.
- 17 (3) A majority of the commission members appointed and serv-
- 18 ing constitutes a quorum. Final action by the commission shall
- 19 be only by affirmative vote of a majority of the commission mem-
- 20 bers appointed and serving. A commission member shall not vote
- 21 by proxy.
- 22 (4) The legislature annually shall fix the per diem compen-
- 23 sation of members of the commission. Expenses of members
- 24 incurred in the performance of official duties shall be reim-
- 25 bursed as provided by law for state employees.
- 26 (5) The department shall furnish administrative services to
- 27 the commission and shall provide secretarial and other staff

- 1 necessary to allow the proper exercise of the powers and duties
- 2 of the commission. The department shall provide adequate office
- 3 space to the commission. The department shall make available the
- 4 times and places of commission meetings and keep minutes of the
- 5 meetings and a record of the actions of the commission.
- 6 (6) The department shall assign professional employees to
- 7 staff the commission to assist the commission in the performance
- 8 of its substantive responsibilities under this act.
- 9 Sec. 7. (1) A meeting of the commission shall be held pur-
- 10 suant to the open meetings act, Act No. 267 of the Public Acts of
- 11 1976, being sections 15.261 to 15.275 of the Michigan Compiled
- 12 Laws. Public notice of the time, date, and place of the meeting
- 13 shall be given in the manner required by Act No. 267 of the
- 14 Public Acts of 1976.
- 15 (2) A writing prepared, owned, used, in the possession of,
- 16 or retained by the commission or office in the performance of an
- 17 official function shall be made available to the public pursuant
- 18 to the freedom of information act, Act No. 442 of the Public Acts
- 19 of 1976, being sections 15.231 to 15.246 of the Michigan Compiled
- 20 Laws.
- 21 Sec. 9. The commission shall do all of the following:
- 22 (a) Stimulate and encourage the study and review of the
- 23 status of African Americans in this state.
- 24 (b) Develop a unified policy and plan of action to serve the
- 25 needs of African Americans in this state.

- 1 (c) Advise the governor, the legislature, and the office 2 concerning the coordination and administration of state programs 3 serving African Americans.
- 4 (d) Make recommendations to the governor and legislature 5 regarding changes in state programs, statutes, and policies.
- 6 (e) Advise the governor and legislature of the nature, mag7 nitude, and priorities of the problems of African Americans in
 8 this state.
- 9 (f) Review and approve grants to be made from federal,10 state, or private funds that are administered by the office.
- 11 (g) Review and advise the governor and the legislature on 12 the state's policies concerning African American affairs.
- (h) Secure appropriate recognition of African Americanaccomplishments and contributions to this state.
- 15 (i) Review and approve the annual report by the office of 16 African American affairs as described in section 13(h).
- (j) Make recommendations to the governor and legislature

 18 regarding methods of overcoming discrimination against African

 19 Americans in public and private employment and civil and politi
 20 cal rights.
- (k) Strengthen home life by directing attention to criticalproblems confronting African Americans in single parenthouseholds.
- (1) Promote more effective methods for enabling African25 Americans to develop their skills, to continue their education,26 and to be trained in employment skills.

- 1 (m) Cooperate with and coordinate activities with the Indian
- 2 affairs commission, the commission on Spanish-speaking affairs,
- 3 and the Michigan women's commission.
- 4 (n) Monitor, evaluate, investigate, advocate, and initiate
- 5 programs for the betterment of African Americans in this state.
- 6 (o) Promote African American entrepreneurship.
- 7 Sec. 11. (1) The office of African American affairs is cre-
- 8 ated in the department of civil rights.
- 9 (2) The commission shall select the director of the office
- 10 with the concurrence of the executive director of the department
- 11 of civil rights in accordance with state civil service
- 12 procedures.
- 13 (3) The department shall furnish administrative services to
- 14 the office and shall provide secretarial and other staff neces-
- 15 sary to allow the proper exercise of the powers and duties of the
- 16 office. The department shall provide adequate office space to
- 17 the office.
- 18 (4) The department shall assign professional employees to
- 19 staff the office necessary to assist the office in the per-
- 20 formance of its substantive responsibilities under this act.
- 21 Sec. 13. The office shall do all of the following:
- 22 (a) Provide the commission with information concerning the
- 23 problems of African Americans and implement commission policy.
- 24 (b) Conduct studies and recommend solutions to the problems
- 25 of African Americans in the areas of education, employment, civil
- 26 rights, health, housing, senior citizens, and other related
- 27 areas.

- (c) Recommend to federal, state, and local governmental
 departments and agencies the creation of services and facilities
 as needed.
- 4 (d) Serve as a clearinghouse for the collection and distri-5 bution of information on African American affairs.
- (e) Apply for and accept grants and gifts from governmental7 and private sources.
- 8 (f) Request the services of all state and local governmental 9 departments and agencies to assure that African Americans have 10 access to decision making bodies, the policies of which affect 11 African Americans in this state.
- (g) Cooperate with departments and agencies to aid in effects tuating the purposes of this act.
- (h) Submit a full written report of its activities and rec-15 ommendations each year to the governor, legislature, and various 16 African American communities throughout the state.
