## EXECUTIVE BUDGET BILL

January 25, 1994, Introduced by Senators Gast and McManus and referred to the Committee on Appropriations

A bill to make appropriations for the department of natural resources for the fiscal year ending September 30 1995 to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations to create funds and accounts to require reports to prescribe certain powers and duties of certain state departments and officers institutions and agencies to authorize certain transfers by certain state agencies and to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the various state agencies
