A bill to make appropriations for the department of history, arts, and libraries, certain other state departments, and certain other state purposes for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2002; to make, supplement, and adjust appropriations for certain state departments and certain other state purposes for the fiscal years ending September 30, 2001 and September 30, 2002; to provide for the expenditure of those appropriations; to provide for the imposition of certain fees; to provide for the disposition of fees and other income received by the state agencies; to provide for reports to certain persons; to prescribe powers and duties of certain state departments and certain state and local agencies and officers; and to repeal acts and parts of acts.

26 Sec. 256. The director of each department receiving appropriations
27 in part 1 shall take all reasonable steps to ensure businesses in

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1deprived and depressed communities compete for and perform contracts to
2provide services or supplies, or both. Each director shall strongly
3encourage firms with which the department contracts to subcontract with
4certified businesses in depressed and deprived communities for services,
5supplies, or both.

6 Sec. 257. Of the funds appropriated in part 1 that are in units
7other than the grants unit, the department shall not provide grants to
8local government agencies, institutions of higher education, or nonprofit
9organizations unless the department provides notice of the grant to the
10subcommittees at least 10 days before the grant is issued or at least 72
11hours before any announcement to local governmental units or the public.

12 Sec. 258. The department shall establish and maintain affirmative
13action programs based on guidelines developed by the state equal opportu-
14nity workforce planning council which was created by Executive Order
15No. 1996-13 in order to receive general fund/general purpose dollars.

16DEPARTMENT OPERATIONS

17 Sec. 301. (1) The appropriations in part 1 may be used for per diem
18payments to the members of commissions, boards, or committees for a full
19day of commission, board, or committee work at which a quorum is present,
20for attending a hearing as authorized by the respective commission,
21board, or committee, or for performing official business as authorized by
22each respective commission, board, or committee.

23 (2) The per diem payments shall be \$50.00 per day for all commis-
24sions and boards.

COUNCIL FOR ARTS AND CULTURAL AFFAIRS

2 Sec. 401. (1) The Michigan council for arts and cultural affairs in
3the department shall administer the arts and cultural grants appropriated
4in part 1. The council shall provide for fair and independent decisions
5on arts and cultural grant requests based upon published criteria to
6evaluate program quality. This criteria shall include a prohibition of
7art projects that include displays of human wastes on religious symbols,
8displays of sex acts, and depictions of flag desecration. The council
9shall seek to award grants on an equitable geographic basis to the extent
10possible given the quality of grant applications received. Priority
11shall be given to projects that serve multiple counties and that leverage
12significant additional public and private investment. Counties, cities,
13villages, townships, community foundations, and organizations, including
14science museums/centers, may apply for the following categories of

15grants:

16 (a) Anchor organization program for organizations that serve a
17statewide audience. Anchor organizations shall demonstrate a commitment
18to education, to mentoring smaller organizations, and to reaching under-
19served audiences.

20 (b) Arts projects program.

21 (c) Arts and learning program.

22 (d) Artists in schools program.

23 (e) Arts organization development program.

24 (f) Capital improvement projects for cities, villages, and townships
25(CTV) program.

26 (g) Local, regional, or statewide arts agencies services program.

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1 (h) Regional regranting program.

2 (i) Partnership program.

3 (j) Discretionary grants program.

4 (k) Rural arts and cultural projects.

5 (2) The council shall establish a regional services provider subcat-
6egory within the arts projects program to serve mid-level and larger
7organizations that serve a regional audience. Organizations receiving
8grants within this subcategory shall demonstrate that they have regional
9impact as well as a commitment to education, to mentoring smaller organi-
10zations, and to reaching underserved audiences.

11 (3) Potential applicants, including anchor organizations, that are
12considered ineligible to apply for grants and applicants that are unsuc-
13cessful in obtaining a grant shall be provided by the council with the
14following:

15 (a) A written rationale as to why the potential applicant was con-
16sidered ineligible or why the applicant's grant was not funded.

17 (b) A description of actions the potential applicant or applicant
18needs to take in order to become eligible or to receive funding in future
19years.

20 (4) The council shall distribute the funds appropriated in part 1 in
21a manner which achieves the following criteria:

22 (a) Supports the development of the regional services provider sub-
23category and provides sufficient funding to organizations meeting the
24criteria for this subcategory as described in subsection (2) and the
25council's guidelines.

26 (b) Preserves the funding capacity for the council to provide
27sufficient funding to new applicants for the anchor organization program

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1that meet the criteria for this category as described in subsection
2(1)(a) and the council's guidelines.

3 (5) Funds allocated outside of the categories described in subsec-
4tion (4)(a) and (b) shall be allocated to the remaining grant categories
5in the same general proportions as the council has allocated funding to
6these categories in recent fiscal years.

7 (6) The appropriation for arts and cultural grants in part 1 and
8disbursed under this section shall, at a minimum, be matched on an equal
9dollar-for-dollar basis from local and private contributions paid and
10received by each awardee receiving grants under this section. The
11dollar-for-dollar match may include the reasonable value of services,
12materials, and equipment as allowed under the federal internal revenue
13code for charitable contributions subject also to the preapproval of such
14a match by the Michigan council for arts and cultural affairs. The coun-
15cil shall receive proof of the entire amount of the matching funds, serv-
16ices, materials, or equipment by the end of the award period. The coun-
17cil shall submit a report to the subcommittees regarding those counties,
18cities, villages, townships, community foundations, and organizations
19failing to meet their matching requirements by the end of the award
20period.

21 (7) Before any amount appropriated for arts and cultural grants in
22part 1 may be expended for a grant to eligible applicants for the pur-
23poses in this section, the department shall execute a grant agreement
24with each grantee. The grant agreement shall specify the criteria
25included in this section with which the application complies. The grant
26agreement shall include a list of the projects funded. The subcommittees

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1 shall receive a summary of the projects funded for each grant recipient
2 by November 1, 2001.

3 (8) By February 1, 2002, the department shall report to the state
4 budget office and the subcommittees on how the council intends to imple-
5 ment the arts and cultural grants program for the following fiscal year,
6 including the process for evaluating organization quality, efforts to
7 achieve an equitable geographic distribution of grants, and a summary of
8 any revisions to the guidelines for the council's grant programs. The
9 department shall submit copies of the guidelines for each grant category
10 to the state budget office and the subcommittees by February 1, 2002.

11 (9) The department shall submit a report to the state budget office,
12 the subcommittees, and the fiscal agencies by October 1, 2001, listing
13 the grant applicants under this section. The report shall include the
14 following:

15 (a) The amount requested by the applicant.

16 (b) Any amount awarded to the applicant.

17 (c) The grant category under which the applicant applied.

18 (d) The county in which the organization resides.

19 (e) The expected number of patrons during the grant period.

20 (f) The amount of matching funds proposed to be contributed by the
21 applicant.

22 (g) The organization's score as determined by the relevant peer
23 review panel during the application evaluation process.

24 (10) By September 1, 2002, the department shall submit to the state
25 budget office, the fiscal agencies, and the subcommittees a summary of
26 the regranted awards made by regrantee organizations from funds

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1 appropriated in part 1. For each regranteeing organization, the report
2 shall include the following:

3 (a) The name of each grantee.

4 (b) The amount received by the grantee.

5 (c) The county in which the grantee resides.

6 (11) Counties, cities, villages, townships, community foundations,
7 and organizations receiving funds under this section shall provide the
8 following reports to the Michigan council for arts and cultural affairs,
9 to the subcommittees, and to the fiscal agencies:

10 (a) A final report covering the grant period and due within 30 days
11 after the end of the grant period indicating at least the following:

12 (i) Revenues and expenditures, indicating whether revenues are from
13 private donations or fees.

14 (ii) Number of employees.

15 (iii) Number of new hires.

16 (iv) Number of patrons attracted during the grant period.

17 (b) For awardees receiving grants greater than \$100,000.00, a copy
18 of the awardee's annual report and audit report for the fiscal year in
19 which the majority of the grant took place due within 90 days after the
20 end of the awardee's fiscal year. The audit report shall include an
21 audit of grant funds. A representative sampling of grant agreements
22 shall be audited by the state auditor general. The audit report shall be
23 submitted to the state budget office and the subcommittees for review.
24 These awardees shall also submit the information in subdivision (a) on a
25 quarterly basis for the immediately preceding quarter due on January 7,
26 April 7, July 7, and October 7 of each year.

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1 (12) The recipients of grant funds under this section shall be
2announced by the department by October 1, 2001. The department shall,
3within 1 day following the final council vote, provide the subcommittees
4and each legislator whose district is receiving a grant with a list of
5grant awardees.

6 (13) A grant awarded under this section and the matching funds which
7conferred eligibility for the grant award shall be used by the recipient
8of the grant award and shall not be redistributed by that recipient to
9any other entity unless specifically provided for in the grant agreement
10between the funded grant awardee and the Michigan council for arts and
11cultural affairs.

12 (14) The applicants for arts and cultural grant funds shall be
13charged a nonrefundable application fee of \$100.00 or 1% of the grant,
14whichever is less. The application fee may be used by the department to
15recover direct and indirect costs as appropriated in part 1.

16 (15) It is the intent of the legislature that the Michigan council
17for arts and cultural affairs continue to take appropriate steps to
18ensure that all organizations receiving state arts anchor organization
19grants have combined grant awards, as defined in subsection (17), of no
20more than 15.0% of operating revenue for the fiscal year ending
21September 30, 2005 and beyond. As used in this subsection, "operating
22revenue" is defined in the same manner as it was defined during the
23fiscal year 2000 state arts anchor organization application process.

24 (16) The council shall continue and expand its efforts to encourage
25and support nonprofit arts and cultural organizations transitioning from
26solely volunteer-based organizations to professional directed
27operations. This includes the provision of funds and services from the

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1arts organization development, partnership, arts projects, regional
2services provider, and regional regranting programs as well as the rural
3arts and culture initiative to support professional development within
4these organizations. Criteria for support include the requirement of
5collaboration between these organizations and other community
6organizations.

7 (17) Any organizations receiving grants within the anchor organiza-
8tion program category in excess of 10.0% of their operating revenue, as
9defined in subsection (15), for the fiscal year ending September 30,
102001, shall not receive a combined grant award from all grant categories,
11except the partnership program, that is greater than the combined grant
12award from these categories that the organization received for the fiscal
13year ending September 30, 2001.

14 (18) The council shall make available to an awardee any written com-
15ments that are available regarding that awardee's application and peer
16review process.

17 (19) The council shall provide for fair, equitable, and efficient
18distribution of funds granted through the regional regranting program.
19The council shall provide for an annual assessment of grant management
20and distribution of mini-grant awards by designated regional regranting
21agencies and review the methodology employed and report these findings to
22the state budget office and the subcommittees.

23 (20) The arts organization development program shall provide funding
24for organizations that deliver services to cultural groups and individual
25artists in all disciplines and that foster long-term development of a
26community or region. Projects and programs funded through this program
27shall be designed to strengthen Michigan families and communities by

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1ensuring full public access to quality arts and cultural activities,
2promoting cultural tourism, and providing for quality arts and cultural
3education.

4 (21) The council shall make every effort to provide total grant
5awards in the anchor organization program at a level not to exceed 65% of
6the total amount appropriated for arts and cultural grants.

7 (22) The council shall assess its granting processes and procedures
8to strengthen consumer and industry access to arts and cultural informa-
9tion, services, and funding opportunities and shall explore new technol-
10ogy applications. The council shall report these findings and shall pro-
11vide a progress report on steps taken to implement the new initiatives
12prescribed by the legislature in this section by February 1, 2002, to the
13subcommittees.

14 Sec. 402. The department may receive and expend contributions from
15public, private, and federal sources, except state agencies, for the pur-
16pose of acquiring or constructing art objects or promoting or preserving
17the arts in or on state properties. Expenditures of any funds received
18shall be consistent with the purposes of the Faxon-McNamee art in public
19places act, 1980 PA 105, MCL 18.71 to 18.81. Any funds received under
20this section are considered a work project account and may be carried
21forward into the succeeding fiscal year.

22MICHIGAN HISTORICAL PROGRAM

23 Sec. 501. The federal funds appropriated in part 1 for the historic
24site preservation grants are for work projects and shall not lapse at the
25end of the fiscal year but shall continue to be available for expenditure

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1until the projects for which the funds were reserved have been completed
2or are terminated. The purpose of these work projects is the identifica-
3tion, designation, and preservation of historic resources. The method
4used will be to solicit applications from eligible recipients, score
5applications based upon established criteria, and award the contracts and
6subgrants. The total cost is \$1,348,500.00 and the tentative completion
7date is September 30, 2003.

8 Sec. 502. Funds collected by the department under sections 3, 6, 7,
9and 7a of 1913 PA 271, MCL 399.3, 399.6, 399.7, and 399.7a, are appropri-
10ated to the department for the purpose for which they were received and
11shall not lapse to the general fund at the end of the fiscal year.

12 Sec. 503. For purposes of administering the museum store as pro-
13vided in section 7a of 1913 PA 271, MCL 399.7a, the department is exempt
14from section 261 of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,
15MCL 18.1261.

16 Sec. 504. (1) From the state funds appropriated in part 1, the
17department may award discretionary historical grants to preserve Michigan
18lighthouses. The department may award up to \$153,900.00 in grants for
19this purpose and may use a portion of those funds to assist in the trans-
20fer of lighthouses from federal ownership. A portion of the funds may
21also be dedicated to program administration and project coordination.

22 (2) The department shall allocate grant funds pursuant to eligibil-
23ity and scoring requirements established by the department. The method
24used will be to solicit applications from eligible recipients, score
25applications based on the established criteria, and award grants through
26executed contracts.

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1 (3) Grants may be awarded for purposes of stabilization,
2 rehabilitation, or other preservation work on a Michigan lighthouse, but
3 shall not be awarded for operational purposes. The department shall not
4 allocate a grant that exceeds \$20,000.00.

5 (4) The funds appropriated and allocated by this section are for
6 work projects. The funds shall not lapse to the general fund at the end
7 of the fiscal year but shall remain available in subsequent fiscal years,
8 until funds have been expended, the projects for which the funds were
9 reserved have been completed, or the projects are terminated, whichever
10 occurs first. The tentative date for completion is September 30, 2003.

11 Sec. 505. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for historical
12 administration and services, \$71,200.00 shall be allocated to support the
13 operations of the Michigan freedom trail commission as specified in
14 section 4 of the Michigan freedom trail commission act, 1998 PA 409,
15 MCL 399.84. These funds shall be used to reimburse commission members,
16 to pay for necessary contractual services of the commission, and to hire
17 not more than 1.0 FTE position in the department's Michigan historical
18 center to support commission operations.

(2) The department shall report to the house of representatives and
senate on the status of the freedom trail commission created under the
Michigan freedom trail commission act, 1998 PA 409, MCL 399.81 to
399.85, including its activities.

19 Sec. 506. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, the
20 department shall collect an application fee of \$250.00 for each applica-
21 tion submitted under section 1 of 1955 PA 10, MCL 399.151, for property
22 designated as a state historic site.

23 (2) The department shall deposit the fees collected under
24 subsection (1) in a separate revolving fund. Any revenue remaining in
25 the fund at the end of the fiscal year shall not lapse to the general
26 fund but shall remain available for future expenditures. The department
27 may expend any revenues in the fund immediately upon receipt.

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1 Expenditures shall be made only for the purpose of correcting, repairing,
2 or replacing numbered markers erected pursuant to section 2 of 1955
3 PA 10, MCL 399.152.

4 Sec. 507. (1) The department may accept gifts, donations, contribu-
5 tions, bequests, and grants of money from any public or private source,
6 including fund-raising license plate donations, to assist with underwrit-
7 ing the discretionary historical grant program, including administrative
8 and other associated costs, for the preservation of Michigan
9 lighthouses.

10 (2) Funds accepted by the department under subsection (1) are appro-
11 priated and allotted when received and may be expended immediately upon
12 receipt or at any later time. Any money remaining in the fund at the end
13 of the fiscal year shall not lapse to the general fund but shall remain
14 available for future expenditures for the purposes for which they were
15 given.

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20 CLEAN MICHIGAN INITIATIVE

21 Sec. 551. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1 for
22 the environmental cleanup and redevelopment program, leaking underground
23 storage tank cleanup program, and the contaminated lake and river sedi-
24 ments cleanup programs, the department of environmental quality is

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1 authorized to expend amounts remaining from prior fiscal year
2 appropriations to meet funding needs of legislatively approved sites.

3 (2) Unexpended and unencumbered amounts remaining from appropria-
4 tions from the environmental protection bond fund contained in 1989 PA
5 180, 1990 PA 55, 1990 PA 194, 1991 PA 31, 1991 PA 160, 1993 PA 74, 1993
6 PA 353, 1994 PA 442, 1996 PA 353, and 1997 PA 114 are appropriated for
7 expenditure for any site listed in this act and any site listed in the
8 public acts referenced in this section.

9 (3) Unexpended and unencumbered amounts remaining from appropria-
10 tions from the cleanup and redevelopment fund and unclaimed bottle depos-
11 its fund contained in 1996 PA 319, 1997 PA 113, 1997 PA 114, 1998 PA 292,
12 1999 PA 125, 2000 PA 275, and 2001 PA 43 are appropriated for expenditure
13 for any site listed in this act and any site listed in the public acts
14 referenced in this section.

15 (4) Unexpended and unencumbered amounts remaining from appropria-
16 tions from the clean Michigan initiative fund response activities con-
17 tained in 1999 PA 111, 2000 PA 52, and 2000 PA 506 are appropriated for
18 expenditure for any site listed in this act and any site listed in the
19 public acts referenced in this section.

20 Sec. 552. The unexpended portions of the appropriations in part 1
21 for the department of environmental quality listed in this section are
22 considered work project appropriations. The purpose of these projects is
23 to provide redevelopment and contaminated site cleanup and pollution pre-
24 vention control to be accomplished through contractual services with an
25 estimated completion date of September 30, 2006. The projects are as
26 follows:

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1 (a) Environmental cleanup and redevelopment program (estimated cost
2\$35,720,000.00).

3 (b) Municipal landfill match grant program (estimated cost
4\$4,000,000.00).

5 (c) Leaking underground storage tank cleanup program (estimated cost
6\$15,146,000.00).

7 (d) Abandoned well management program (estimated cost
8\$2,400,000.00).

9 (e) Conservation reserve enhancement program (estimated cost
10\$3,000,000.00).

11 (f) Pollution prevention program (estimated cost \$1,275,000.00).

12 Sec. 553. The unexpended portions of the appropriations in part 1
13for the department of environmental quality listed in this section are
14considered work project appropriations. The purpose of these projects is
15for the purchase of wetlands and for the city of Saginaw riverwalk
16development. They will be accomplished by contract with an estimated
17completion date of September 30, 2006. The projects are as follows:

18 Land and water management - GM powertrain - Saginaw malleable iron
19facility supplemental environmental projects (estimated cost
20\$58,200.00).

21 Environmental response - GM powertrain - Saginaw (estimated cost
22\$89,800.00).

Sec. 557. The department shall submit a report on water quality monitoring activities supported by clean water fund, clean Michigan initiative bond revenue. This report shall include a list of all contracted groups or organizations, the beach or river where monitoring is to occur, and the amount of funds provided to each group or organization. This report shall be submitted on May 15, 2002 to the house and senate appropriations subcommittees on environmental quality.

2MICHIGAN STRATEGIC FUND

3 Sec. 601. (1) The funds appropriated in section 103(2) of Senate
4Bill No. 232 of the 91st Legislature for health and aging research and
5development strategies are appropriated to support basic and applied
6research in health-related areas, with emphasis on issues related to
7aging. The program shall be administered by the Michigan economic devel-
8opment corporation.

9 (2) A health and aging steering committee, appointed by the gover-
10nor, shall consist of 14 members including the CEO of the Michigan eco-
11nomic development corporation, a member from Michigan State University,
12the University of Michigan, Wayne State University, the Van Andel
13Institute, and 2 members from the private sector. The remaining members
14shall be appointed at large and may include members from the private
15sector, public sector, or other Michigan universities. Committee members
16are authorized to designate alternate members. The purpose of the steer-
17ing committee is to provide advice and oversight of the initiative,
18including the development of criteria for the award of contracts or
19grants to qualifying universities, institutions, or individuals. The
20steering committee will make decisions regarding distribution of these
21grant funds and has the authority to make minor adjustments to the cate-
22gory funding percentage based upon the demands within categories and the
23quality of the applications received.

24 (3) Of the funds appropriated, up to \$2,500,000.00 may be used for
25administering the initiative and not less than \$5,000,000.00 shall be
26used to support a commercial development fund to support

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1commercialization opportunities for life science research in Michigan.

2Of the remaining funds appropriated, 45% are allocated for a basic
3research fund, to be distributed on a competitive basis to Michigan uni-
4versities or Michigan nonprofit research institutes, or both, for basic
5research in health-related areas. Not less than \$4,000,000.00 is allo-
6cated to research related to aging diseases and health problems. In
7addition, 55% of the remaining appropriated funds are earmarked for a
8collaborative research fund to support peer-reviewed collaborative grants
9among Michigan universities and/or private research facilities, with
10emphasis on testing or developing emerging discoveries.

11 (4) Repayment of any funds received as a result of awards made under
121999 PA 120, 2000 PA 292, or this act including, but not limited to,
13funds received as interest or return on investment shall be deposited in
14the fund described in subsection (3) from which it was awarded to be
15expended for the same purposes. These funds are authorized for expendi-
16ture upon receipt and shall not lapse to the general fund.

17 (5) The records of the health and aging steering committee involving
18a proposal submitted by an eligible entity that are of a scientific,
19technical, or proprietary nature, the release of which could cause com-
20petitive harm to the eligible entity as determined by the health and
21aging steering committee, are exempt from disclosure under the freedom of
22information act, 1976 PA 442, MCL 15.231 to 15.246.

23 Sec. 602. The appropriation contained in part 1 for the southwest
24Michigan innovation center is contingent on the refund to the general
25fund of the grant to the Kalamazoo aviation history museum contained in
262000 PA 291.

Sec. 603. Of the funds appropriated in 2001 PA 80 for the Michigan promotion program, at least 25% of all program funds shall be used to promote cultural tourism opportunities in Michigan. In addition, \$200,000.00 shall be used to promote tourism activities in the northeast region of this state.

Sec. 604. The funding appropriated in part 1 for the Oscoda Wurtsmith Airport Authority shall be used to provide assistance to former TIMCO company employees.

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1NATURAL RESOURCES TRUST FUND

2 Sec. 701. The department of natural resources shall require local
3units of government to enter into agreements with the department for the
4purpose of administering the natural resources trust fund grants identi-
5fied in part 1. Among other provisions, the agreements shall require
6that grant recipients agree to dedicate to public outdoor recreation uses
7in perpetuity the land acquired or developed; to replace lands converted
8or lost to other than public outdoor recreation use; and for parcels
9acquired that are over 5 or more acres in size, to provide the state with
10a nonparticipating 1/6 minimum royalty interest in any acquired minerals
11that are retained by the grant recipient. The agreements shall also pro-
12vide that the full payments of grants can be made only after proof of
13acquisition, or completion of the development project, is submitted by
14the grant recipient and all costs are verified by the department of natu-
15ral resources.

16 Sec. 702. Any unobligated balance in any natural resources trust
17fund appropriation made under part 1 shall not revert to the funds from
18which appropriated at the close of the fiscal year, but shall continue
19until the purpose for which it was appropriated is completed for a period
20not to exceed 3 fiscal years. The unexpended balance of any natural
21resources trust fund appropriation made in section 102 remaining after
22the purpose for which it was appropriated is completed shall revert to
23the Michigan natural resources trust fund and be made available for
24appropriation.

13DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

14 Sec. 1301. (1) The department is authorized to receive and expend up
15to \$4,084,900 from the USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation to assist
16 Michigan's specialty crop producers. These funds are to be allocated as
17 follows:

18 (a) \$500,000 for support activities that promote agriculture

19 including:

20 (i) Establishment and expansion of export markets;

21 (ii) Facilitate implementation of funded value-added projects; and

22 (iii) Administrative support for grant development and processing.

23 (b) Up to \$3,250,000 for program grants that develop new or expand
existing markets for specialty crop producers including:

(i) Up to \$2,100,000 in direct program grants to Michigan's specialty
crop producers; and

(ii) \$1,150,000 to the agricultural development fund for the support of
grants for value added agricultural processing and agricultural production
ventures for specialty crops in accordance with the Julian-Stille value-added
act, 2000 PA 322, MCL 285.301 to 285.304.

(c) Up to \$334,900 for grants to provide for the processing,
transportation, and distribution of commodities to eligible recipient
agencies as provided under section 204(a) of the Emergency Food Assistance
Act of 1983 (7 U.S.C. 7508[a]).

(2) Funds appropriated in part 1 for the Specialty Crop Program are
considered work project appropriations and any unencumbered funds are carried
forward into the succeeding fiscal year. The following is in compliance with
section 451(3) of the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1451:

(a) This project will be accomplished through the efforts of state
employees, contracted services and grants to specialty crop producers.

(b) The total estimated cost of this project is \$4,084,900.

(c) The tentative completion date for this project is September 30,
2004.

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1 Sec. 1302. Funds appropriated in part 1a for agriculture
2development will be used to support risk management education of
3specialty crop producers.

4 Sec. 1303. (1) There is appropriated in part 1a of this act from
5the state general fund, an amount of \$5,000,000.00 to the agricultural
6development fund created under section 2 of the Julian-Stille value-added
7act, 2000 PA 322, MCL 285.302.

8 (2) There is appropriated in part 1a of this act to the department
9of agriculture, \$5,000,000.00 from the agricultural development fund for
10a value-adding processing: ethanol grant. The department of agriculture
11shall award a grant of \$5,000,000.00 for an ethanol plant in accordance
12with the Julian-Stille value-added act, 2000 PA 322, MCL 285.302.

13DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY HEALTH

14 Sec. 1401. It is the intent of the legislature that the department
15of community health shall restore funding reduced for migrant health care
16in fiscal year 2000-2001 and continue to fund migrant health care at the
17fiscal year 2000-2001 enacted appropriations levels from existing
18resources.

19DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES

20 Sec. 1501. In accordance with 2001 PA 50, there is appropriated
21from the game and fish protection trust fund to the game and fish protec-
22tion fund \$6,000,000.00 for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2001.

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1DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY

2 Sec. 1601. The \$220,000.00 appropriation in part 1a for executive
3direction shall be provided to the department of natural resources to map
4the location and extent of Native American landholdings in the state of
5Michigan.
