

HOUSE BILL No. 6102

December 6, 2016, Introduced by Reps. Kosowski, Vaupel, Howrylak, Lucido, Santana and Liberati and referred to the Committee on Criminal Justice.

A bill to create the crime survivor trauma recovery center data collection act; to describe the crime survivor trauma recovery center data collection system; and to provide for the powers and duties of certain state and local governmental officers and entities.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

1 Sec. 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as the "crime
2 survivor trauma recovery center data collection act".

3 Sec. 2. As used in this act:

4 (a) "Crime survivor" means any of the following:

5 (i) A victim of an assaultive crime, including, but not
6 limited to, sexual assault, domestic violence, physical assault,
7 vehicular assault, or human trafficking. As used in this
8 subparagraph, "domestic violence" means inflicting bodily injury,

1 causing serious emotional injury, causing psychological trauma, or
2 placing in fear of imminent physical harm by threat or force a
3 person who is a spouse of, a former spouse of, or a person who has
4 had a dating relationship with, resides or has resided with, or has
5 a child in common with the person committing or threatening
6 violence.

7 (ii) Family members of a homicide victim.

8 (iii) Individuals who are 18 years of age or less, who have
9 had contact with the juvenile dependency or justice system, or who
10 have experienced trauma as a result of exposure to violence,
11 including domestic violence.

12 (b) "Crime survivor trauma recovery center" or "CSTRC" means a
13 center established under the crime survivor trauma recovery center
14 act that provides an integrated, structured, and evidence-based
15 program of trauma treatment and support services that meet the
16 minimum criteria as established by the department of health and
17 human services. Crime survivor trauma recovery center or CSTRC does
18 not include a mental health facility or agency unless the facility
19 or agency is awarded a grant by the department under the crime
20 survivor trauma recovery act.

21 (c) "Crime survivor trauma recovery center data collection
22 system" or "system" means the data collection system established by
23 the department under section 3.

24 (d) "Department" means the department of health and human
25 services.

26 (e) "Performance indicator" means a measurement for crime
27 survivor trauma recovery center program processes, service

1 utilization, and program and individual crime survivor outcomes.

2 (f) "Substance abuse disorder" means that term as defined in
3 section 100d of the mental health code, 1974 PA 258, MCL 330.1100d.

4 Sec. 3. (1) The crime survivor trauma recovery center data
5 collection system is established within the department to assess
6 the feasibility, utilization, and crime survivor outcomes
7 associated with each CSTRC.

8 (2) The system shall collect data continuously through the use
9 of an electronic format regarding CSTRCs at the individual crime
10 survivor and program level and shall utilize standardized measures,
11 operationalized variables, and consistent reporting.

12 (3) The department shall select a single database platform
13 that is capable of accepting the transfer and upload of electronic
14 data to collect and maintain the data required to be collected
15 under this act to allow for the accurate comparison of CSTRC
16 program performance.

17 Sec. 4. The data collected under the system established in
18 section 3 must include all of the following:

19 (a) CSTRC program processes using various performance
20 indicators associated with CSTRC program development, operation,
21 and collaboration, including, but not limited to, the following:

22 (i) Collaboration with other public and private human service
23 agencies and outreach activities.

24 (ii) Standardized assessments of a crime survivor's
25 psychological and social well-being at the time of initial
26 evaluation at a CSTRC.

27 (iii) Admission statistics calculated monthly and yearly at

1 each CSTRC.

2 (iv) The length of waiting lists, if any, for admission at
3 each CSTRC.

4 (b) Crime survivor demographics and characteristics, including
5 all of the following:

6 (i) Crime survivor age, race, gender, national origin, sexual
7 orientation, and ethnicity.

8 (ii) Whether the crime survivor is homeless or has a place of
9 residence, and if so, the crime survivor's current home address.

10 (iii) The type of crime victimization the crime survivor has
11 endured, history of prior crime victimization, and any prior
12 involvement in the criminal justice system.

13 (iv) Any previous services received by the crime survivor and
14 whether the crime survivor is chemically dependent or displays
15 symptoms of a substance use disorder.

16 (v) Whether the crime survivor has a previous mental illness
17 diagnosis or displays symptoms indicating he or she may be at risk
18 for suicide.

19 (vi) The crime survivor's income, health insurance status,
20 current employment status, and whether the crime survivor has
21 living family members.

22 (c) The utilization of CSTRC services, including the following
23 performance indicators:

24 (i) Type and frequency of each service provided to each crime
25 survivor.

26 (ii) Dates of service provided to each crime survivor.

27 (iii) Type of therapist or other CSTRC staff member who

1 provides a service to each crime survivor.

2 (iv) The number of treatment sessions authorized for each
3 crime survivor at his or her initial evaluation.

4 (v) The number of additional treatment sessions, if any,
5 authorized for each crime survivor over and above the initially
6 authorized treatment sessions.

7 (d) CSTRC program outcomes through the assessment of the
8 following performance indicators:

9 (i) The number of crime survivors who report their
10 victimization to law enforcement and participate in the prosecution
11 of the crime.

12 (ii) The number and types of services provided to crime
13 survivors and compensation awarded to crime survivors upon
14 application from the crime victim's rights fund created in section
15 4 of 1989 PA 196, MCL 780.904.

16 (iii) The number of crime survivors that actually received
17 compensation from the crime victim's rights fund created in section
18 4 of 1989 PA 196, MCL 780.904.

19 (iv) The ability of a CSTRC to successfully connect a crime
20 survivor to services provided outside of the CSTRC for assistance
21 with housing, employment, child care, or other services not
22 provided by the CSTRC.

23 (v) Whether the services provided to a crime survivor by a
24 CSTRC have assisted that crime survivor with establishing or
25 maintaining family cohesion.

26 (vi) Whether a crime survivor has experienced improvement with
27 any applicable mental health conditions or substance use disorders.

1 (vii) Whether a crime survivor who was unemployed at the time
2 of his or her initial evaluation has subsequently become employed,
3 or a crime survivor who was employed at the time of his or her
4 initial evaluation has maintained his or her employment.

5 Sec. 5. The data required to be collected under this act shall
6 be collected in a timely and consistent fashion. A CSTRC's failure
7 to comply with the data collection required under this act may
8 result in the loss or partial loss of funding for that CSTRC.

9 Enacting section 1. This act takes effect 90 days after the
10 date it is enacted into law.

11 Enacting section 2. This act does not take effect unless
12 Senate Bill No. _____ or House Bill No. 6101 (request no. 06390'16) of
13 the 98th Legislature is enacted into law.
